PROJECT TITLE	SUSTAINABLE ELIMINATION OF CHILD BONDED LABOR IN NEPAL – PHASE 2

PROBLEM TO BE ADDRESSED	The <i>Kamaiya</i> and <i>Haruwa/Charuwa</i> systems of agricultural bonded labor were prevalent in Nepal until July 2001, when the government declared these practices illegal and freed bonded laborers from all debts and prior contracts with their landlords. Many children in families who were freed at this time are still either working under bondage or at risk of entering into the worst forms of child labor. There is concern that these children, particularly the girls of these families, are at risk of becoming victims of trafficking.
TARGETS	The project will target 9,600 boys and girls for withdrawal and prevention from the worst forms of child labor, 8,000 of whom are to be directly mainstreamed into schools. The project also aims to provide 3,400 families with gainful employment and provide another 2,000 men and women with adult literacy classes. The target geographic areas are the districts of Kanchanpur, Kailali, Bardia, Banke, Dang, Dhanusa, Siraha and Saptari.
PROJECT OBJECTIVES	<p>The overall objective of the project is elimination of child bonded labor in Nepal. The project's four immediate objectives include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• At the end of the project, boys and girls and adult members from the targeted families will have received appropriate formal and non-formal education.• At the end of the project, targeted families will be gainfully employed.• At the end of the project, agricultural workers, particularly freed <i>Kamaiyas</i> and <i>Haruwas/Charuwas</i> in the target districts, will receive the minimum and equal wage rates.• At the end of the project, an enabling environment will have been created for effective implementation of the <i>Kamaiya</i> Labour Prohibition Act of 2001 and Child Labour Prohibition Act of 1999.
SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Identification, withdrawal, and prevention of children engaged in and at risk of exploitive child labor;

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- Provision of non-formal education services, followed by mainstreaming of children into the formal education system;
- Provision of vocational/technical skills training, when age-appropriate, and linkages to the job market;
- Provision of appropriate non-formal education (particularly adult literacy classes) to the parents of children in the program;
- Assistance for families to access farmland and appropriate agricultural extension services for on-farm self-employment;
- Assistance for families to access funds/credit and appropriate business services for off-farm self-employment;
- Creation of favorable environment for payment of minimum agricultural wage rates to freed *Kamaiya* men and women;
- Consultation with relevant ministries and legislative bodies; and
- Formation of a task force to draft amendments to current laws on bonded labor, and advocating for the adoption of these amendments by the government.
- As of February 28, 2009, 5,627 children have been withdrawn or prevented from exploitive child labor as a result of this project.
